Three times a month you can choose enough food to make 9 meals or more. And no, you aren't taking food out of the mouths of the hungry. CHAPTERS, RALLIES

What is Chapter Nine? For the uninitiated, chapters, rallies, parks are very confusing. So let's start at the very beginning of Escapees Inc. Escapees started from something like what you now have in your hand: a newsletter! Kay Peterson wrote, on a manual typewriter, the first newsletter and sent it to friends. RVers receiving it wanted to get together and thus were born rallies. At rallies folks discovered others from their area and formed groups called Chapters (there are 57 chapters in the US). We, the ninth chapter, were founded in Casa Grande, AZ. in 1985 with Don and Pat Kuykendall as the "driving force".

Chapter Nine Was Looking for a Park

Recapping the history from previous "Tracks": "The property (90.19 acres) which sold for \$300,000 several years ago, now on Oct. 15, 1988: "The 90.19 acres cost \$80,000".. plus additional costs "for a total of \$90,031". A Bargain, right?

There were over 200 names on the list interested in the 150 sites originally planned here in Sutherlin. Some remember our hillside as a meadow or a cow or sheep pasture. Others think it might have been part of an orchard. Perhaps it had been planted in mint at one time; mint tended to spring up all over where it wasn't wanted. How do we get from that unkempt hillside to the lovely park we have today? First of course there had to be money.

George Nace remembers," We each put in \$1,000. Folks asked, what collateral? And we said: NONE.......A "founding board" was formed, Olen Edwards was hired as contractor and he drew up the plans. Les Bean was advisor to the board, construction had been his business and he attended all the meetings. (from interview with Jackie and Les).

Olen brought his construction equipment and rented it to the park. "He could run it all, we'd have been dead without him," said Bud Schick .The Park bought a used "fire engine", an old tanker truck, and it was used to spray water: the dust was horrible. They also bought "Big Red", track hoe (same truck or different? I'm not sure) And so construction began.

NEWSWORTHY NOTES

We were few but we enjoyed the "Bites, Blues and Brews festival" June 25. at Seven Feathers. For those who worried about sun, no chairs etc., fear not. The South parking lot has a large paved area, covered by a canvas tarp/roof with many tables and comfortable chairs. We suffered not, tho the music wasn't exactly what we think of as blues. The Timber Valley Community Garden report by Sharon Elliot

Rick De Young told me there has been interest among members for a garden in the park for many years. Recently that dream has been renewed by a bunch of us who had working family gardens growing up and know the benefits. That bunch has organized and begun planning. Their objective in their MISSION statement is: "To create an organic community garden at Timber Valley for individuals of all abilities. The garden shall be a welcoming, inclusive space where the focus is on sustainable organic food, education and strengthening bonds of the Park community."

At the May meeting the board voted (7 to 1) to allow the Community Garden Group to create a garden! The CGG is now requesting the approval of a specific site so they can finish detailing plans, including layout design, costs, who will do what and how the project will look upon completion. Meanwhile the CGG will continue fundraising as they are already halfway to their initial goal. This is the largest single purpose group of park members that have the ability and willingness to add an amenity that will serve current and future members allowing them to participate in wholesome healthy exercise.
