In Case You Missed It: Last Month's Timber Valley Amateur Radio Group (TVARG) Submitted by Rachael Smithey

Last month's Timber Valley Amateur Radio Group enjoyed a lively (and laughter-filled) discussion and watched 10 Coaxial Cable Myths Exposed by The SmokinApe Ham Radio.

Coaxial cable (or coax) links the radio to the antenna, carrying signals out when transmitting and back in when receiving. It is also the same type of cable used for TV antennas, internet, and satellite dishes. The video made it clear that not all coax is created equal and that some common assumptions can be misleading. How well a cable works depends on factors like frequency, construction, and shielding, not just appearance. Coax can be damaged by water or age, certain

types are designed for underground use, and even small losses become important at higher frequencies. Check the specs to pick the right cable for the job to keep the signal strong and clear.

In Memoriam: Curtis (Curt) Parmer, Lot 95

Timber Valley was saddened to hear that Curtis (Curt) Parmer of Lot 95 passed away on August 31, 2025 in Roseburg, Oregon.



Curt was born August 20, 1936 in Greenwood, Arkansas. He served in the US Navy from 1954 to 1958 on a mine sweeper. He met his future bride, Caroline (Carol) at church. Curt sang in the choir and Carol later joined the choir. They were married in 1967 in California where they both lived. He worked at Purex before they moved to Texas. They lived in Tomball, Texas and Curt worked for River Plantation in Maintenance for the next 22 years. They came to Timber Valley on June 25, 2010. Curt was active in the park with the Landscape Committee and on the irrigation system.
